Major determined to take advantage of Commonwealth Zonal opportunity

Promoter Vincent Seifert has been given the go-ahead by the Bahamas Boxing Commission (BBC) to utilize all of the avenues available to bring the Commonwealth Zonal Lightweight Championship bout to The Bahamas.

The Commonwealth Boxing Council (CBC) has signed off on the proposed title match between Bahamian Meacher Major and Guyana's Dexter Gonzales. The representative for Guyana on the CBC, Steve Hiscock, and I, as the Bahamian BBC Director, have interacted with Gonzales's camp and a purse has been agreed to.

The ball as they say is in Seifert's court. Perhaps, more appropriate in this case, Seifert is in the center of the ring with all and sundry from the related boxing communities focused on his next move.

Eagerly awaiting the next step by Promoter Seifert is none other than Major, who was quite realistic when we had a recent chat.

Let me point out with emphasis, Major indicated a sincere willingness to work as closely with Seifert as is possible, but freely admitted that at this point in his career, he, the boxer, is the priority.

At 36, Major has good reason for being anxious. Time is certainly running out on him as an active boxer. He is a former regional titleholder. He won the World Boxing Association Caribbean Federation (FEDICAR-IBE) lightweight title way back on May 19 of 2006, almost 12 full years ago.

He yearns to close out a respectable (to this point for sure) career with an even more prestigious championship.

The CBC is quite lenient when it comes to working with smaller member regions. So, there is a grace period that Seifert is being afforded.

I understand Major's approach. He happens to be a prime part of the proposed Zonal title mix and deserves this shot to build upon his sports legacy.
