Yes, Foster is closely related to Phillip. A former track star and Bahamas Association of Athletic Associations (BAAA) President, Foster is a grand uncle, as is Burkett Dorsett (the former Bahamas Softball Federation President). Foster is one of the diehard supporters of the Miami Dolphins, a

team that has been a sorry item in recent years.

He wants the best for Phillip.

"I do not like New England! No, I don't! But, this is the moment in time every player yearns for. They want to make it to the Super Bowl. So, I am happy for my grand nephew and proud of him. "I will be pulling for Phillip

However, if Brady and compa-


