## Ministry of Sports' outreach should connect all programs


## Sports Conclave has comprehensive agenda

The Sports leaders' Conclave that begins today at the National Stadium in the capital island of New Providence is full proof that under Minister of Youth, Sports and Culture Michael Pintard, there is going to be a push to connect those who have assumed significant roles in nation building through sports develop-

For instance, there could be a Sports Leaders' Conclave for the Northern Region, hosted in Grand Bahama, with some travel and accommodation assistance given to those coming in from Abaco, Bimini, The Berry country by catering primarily to the sports leaders and programs in New Providence. The country is much larger than New Providence and the sports leaders and their programs in other parts of The Bahamas are just as entitled, to whatever benefits are afforded, through the Ministry of Sports by the respective central administrations.

So while the forum this weekend is a most worthy effort, the concept has to be expanded.

The topics arranged for the conclave are on point. AttendIntroduction of Sports into High School Curriculum; Disabled Participation in Sports; The Mental Game of Sports; Event Planning; Strategic Planning/ Public Relations and the National Sports Authority.

## Falcons take game one

Thanks to some timely solid play on the part of Seandre Todd and Regis Cooper, The Tabernacle Falcons took game one of the Derek Nesbitt/Obie Wilchombe Senior Boys' High School basketball championship.

The Falcons out-lasted their best of three series opponents, the Jack Hayward Wildcats, 49-46. Todd led the Falcons in scoring with 10 points whilst Cooper and Desmond Butler each add-

ed nine points in the win. It was was a welcome site for Falcons'

coach Kevin Clarke and the crew, who saw Todd and Cooper shake off their past rocky outings this past Wednesday evening at the Jack Hayward Gymnasium. Going into this series facing a tenacious squad in the Wildcats, Clarke made it clear to them they would be needed to come out victorious. He was left pleased with their response on the

"They were ready. And I let them know it's impossible for us to win without them playing at a high level and they did that tonight.

"They (Jack Hayward) are a tough team. Coach (Desmond) Hall has them playing the right away; they're going to play hard. But once we fight we'll be able to maintain."

It was a close and intense first quarter. Still, the Falcons led 11-7 after a Joshua Dames three-pointer near the end of the first quarter.

However, the Wildcats collectively worked their way to an 18-17 lead near the end of the second quarter. But an Ethan Munroe floater gave the Falcons the 19-18 halftime lead.

The defending senior boys champion Falcons were the early aggressors out of the gate in the third quarter. The Wildcats countered the Falcons' energy and utilized their full court press, cut-

ting off the Falcons' momentum. From there, the Wildcats began to catch fire from three-point range. With

the 'Cats trailing 24-25 Clevon Clarke drilled home a three to give them a 27-25 edge. Later down the stretch the Wildcats held a 29-27 lead before a Jalen Hall three from deep boosted the Wildcats' lead, 32-27.

Next, the Wildcats' Shamar Pinder bombed away and hit another triple to give them a 35-27 lead with under three

minutes to go in the fourth. Nonetheless, a late push for the Falcons led by Butler and Todd got them

back in it to trail 35-37, in favor of Ultimately the Falcons found themselves back in front after triples from

Dames and Todd to lead 42-39 early on

in the fourth.

The score was 43-40 with 3 minutes remaining before a Tabby basket gave them a 45-40 lead. McKell Bethel, who finished with eight points in the loss, went to work in the post and made it a 45-42 game with 2:21 left. Off a missed three-pointer by Alfredo Brown, Todd skied in for a put back lay-up to give the Falcons a 47-42 lead with under two minutes left.

The Wildcats made it a 44-47 game with just over 20 seconds left by way of free throws. But Dames crossed over his defender on a drive to the rim for a lay-up that iced the win for the

Game two of the series takes place tonight at 6:00 p.m.
